Programs



Hilliard House

Hilliard House is our short-term, emergency shelter that gets families and single women off the streets and offers comprehensive services to help them access the best permanent housing options available. In addition to sheltering families that may enroll in our own Building Neighbors program, we may also shelter families being rehoused by other organizations that do not have shelter beds.



Building Neighbors

Building Neighbors is a rapid re-housing program that places literally homeless families – referred from our own shelter, other local shelters, and the streets – into safe, affordable homes. Temporary financial assistance with security deposits, utilities, and rent is a key program component. Once housed, we provide services to help them keep their housing, including support in securing higher income, becoming a more confident parent, and building effective coping skills.

Program History

Our organization opened in 2001 as Hilliard House, a long-term transitional shelter for women with children. Based on best practices, the Board of Directors approved a strategic shift in late 2011 from a transitional housing model to one based on a Housing First approach. The **Housing First** approach is grounded in research showing that services to improve well-being are more effective when the family is in their own home.

The **Building Neighbors** rapid re-housing program was launched in 2012, enabling us to provide temporary financial assistance and supportive services to help families quickly move into permanent housing. Over the next four years, our **Hilliard House** program evolved from a transitional housing program into an emergency shelter, and the average length of a family's stay decreased from 19 months to just 30 days. The shelter began to accept not just women with children but families of all compositions, including multigenerational households and those headed by two parents or single fathers. Our name was changed to **Housing Families First** in November 2014 to reflect our growth and expanded approach to ending homelessness among families.

Hilliard House Transitional Housing

- Women and children only
- Length of stay up to two years
- Conditions for participation include being alcohol/drug free
- Provides robust services and connection to resources while in shelter to prepare families to secure and maintain housing
- Participants contribute to savings account while in shelter to save for own move-in expenses
- 15-20 families sheltered annually
- 80%+ of families move to permanent housing
- Average cost of \$30,000 per family

Hilliard House Emergency Shelter

- Families with minor children and, as needed, single women
- Average length of stay 30 days
- No pre-conditions to participation such as employment or sobriety
- Provides temporary financial assistance with move-in costs/rent to quickly move families to permanent housing with lease in own name
- Connects families to community resources once in housing
- 65-70 families sheltered annually
- 85% of families move to permanent housing
- Average cost of \$8,200 per family



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Program Impact



The number of families we serve annually has grown significantly – nearly eight-fold over the past five years. But, do our programs work in ending homelessness for these families?

In FY2016, 86 households -- 243 children and adults – were referred to our programs. Here are the results:

- 90% of these families moved into permanent housing.
- It took only 30 days, on average, to move a family into permanent housing once they were referred to a Housing Families First program.
- **85%** of families have not returned to homelessness one year after leaving our Building Neighbors program.

Even when we look back three full years, just over **80%** of families have not returned to a shelter or another re-housing program. **In short, Housing Families First works.**

Resources and Stewardship

Building a better future for children and their families begins with Housing Families First. But, housing families quickly takes resources – both financial and in-kind. That is why your gifts are so important to us.

The Board of Directors and staff are committed to increasing our annual budget, so that we remain financially stable and highly effective while serving more families each year. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we achieved the following financial results in FY2016:

- Total revenues increased by almost \$200,000 over the previous year – a 25% increase.
- Private contributions and grants alone increased by \$154,000, a 59% improvement over FY2015.
- Our Change in Net Assets improved by \$104,000 over the previous year.
- \$50,000 in in-kind donations enabled us to enhance the services provided for families.
- \$.89 of every dollar donated went directly to our programs for families.

Real Results

Facts and figures are important, but they cannot capture the true impact of our work. Only the success stories of our families can do that. Families like the W family, who spent 13 days at Hilliard House in June. Mr. and Mrs. W, former Central Virginia restaurant owners, found themselves caught in a financial gap while between contract jobs. Hilliard House served as a safe, supportive stopover for the family as they worked with the Housing Families First team to move into a permanent home. Now, Mom and Dad are back to work, all four children are back in school, and the family is back on their feet. When asked if we could share their story, the W family immediately responded, "Yes!!! Without you guys, there would be no good story to tell." Real families. Real results.
